highlights were seeing an original Texas Jack poster recently obtained by the museum and holding some of Buffalo Bill's and Annie Oakley's guns. A very nice luncheon was held at noon in one of the BBHC's gardens. That evening everyone met at the stadium for an entertaining night of rodeo. The Stampede rodeo was being held this same week and we were fortunate enough to see some of today's best rodeo performers. Dr. Fees also had written a synopsis on

Texas Jack which was read to the crowd as well as having us introduced as a group.

Friday, July 3rd, began with some members taking an early whitewater rafting adventure while others attended a parade held on Main Street. The parade featured James Drury (Grand Marshall) who played the lead role in a TV show called "The Virginian." A couple even ventured as far as Yellowstone to take in the sights there. At 6:00 PM everyone met at the Irma Hotel to watch a reenactment of a shootout on the streets of a western town. The shootout featured Jim West as Wild Bill Hickok, the town's sheriff.

three parades held in Cody over the past three days. Some visited the craft fair held at the City Park while others shopped along Main Street. Again, we invited Jim West (Wild Bill), his wife Linda, and Ebb Tarr (Buffalo Bill) to be our guests. Once again they entertained us with stories about the characters

## MINUTES of the ASSOCIATION'S BIENNIAL BUSINESS MEETING

The meeting of the Texas Jack Association was held July 4, 1998 in Cody WY with 37 members present.

The minutes and treasurer's report of 1996 were read and approved.

### Projects Reports:

1. Julie Greene reports that they had no luck getting a Texas Jack **postage stamp** yet.
2. There has been no work since the last Roundup toward getting a **peak in Yellowstone** named for Texas Jack.

Suggestions were made to write your congressman, asking for his support in these projects.

Bill Omohundro of Buffalo, WY will work on naming a peak in Yellowstone for Texas Jack.

3. Three **historical markers** have been placed in Leadville CO, one at the north entrance of town, given by Edna Nees in loving memory of her husband John S. Nees, grand nephew of Texas Jack, a second marker at the east entrance of town given by the Texas Jack Association, and a third marker at the entrance to Evergreen Cemetery where Texas Jack is buried, given by Astrid Omohundro in loving memory of her husband, Stuart W. Omohundro, grand nephew of Texas Jack.

4. Donations were requested for the **fence** that was put around Texas Jack's grave. Several people wrote checks on the spot (see page 19 for the full list of 1998 donors to date).

5. Richard E. Omohundro has produced a Texas Jack Association **web page**. The URL is [www.texas-jack.org](http://www.texas-jack.org)

Discussion was held that the Association should pay for this. Jack Omohundro, Sr. said he and Dick would take care of the bill for the web page.

6. Discussion was held on having more T-shirts made and/or **polo shirts** and **sweatshirts** with a Texas Jack logo. (See page 14 to place an order.)

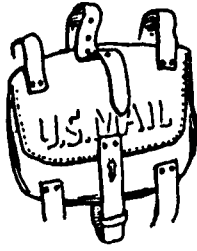

*Keith's enclosure was from the North Platte Cemetery Book, Vol. II, North Platte, Nebraska:*

"22. **Murder victim.** The first woman buried in the "new" North Platte Cemetery was Catherine McManus, alias Kate Manning. Her killer, who strangled her, was never brought to trial. She died May 9, 1871, aged 27 years, 20 months and 15 days. . . . It was believed that her brother Peter Manning killed her, but at a trial held in Grand Island, he was found not guilty."

*This gives you some idea how rough life on the frontier was.*

*Keith adds in a June 29 card: "I became interested in Texas Jack because of my interest in Wm. F. Cody. They go together."*

*Our next correspondent notes that he is related to Texas Jack through the Luthy family line. He and a twin brother were born in Missouri in 1925. He offers a testimonial to Texas Jack.*

Two of my brothers still live in Ohio as does my sister. I moved to Northern California in 1964. I have a brother who lives in Southern California. I am wondering where in you fit with the Omohundros?

It follows my father's family. That's the web site where I found your name. I also saw the Texas Jack group. I wrote to a couple other Omohundros besides you. My parents were divorced when I was 7 years old and my mother didn't want us to have anything to do with my father's side of the family so I lost track of everyone. None of my father's brothers lived in Ohio, though. There is a company in El Seguno, CA (I don't think that's spelled right) called the Omohundro Company they make raydomes and my husband buys them for the company he works

*Some readers will recall that Texas Jack had a namesake who was a Wild West showman in South Africa. M. H. Omohundro, Jr. found the following piece of unsigned Australian verse originally printed in March, 1890, about the latter Texas Jack:*

June 2, 1998

Dear Kitty,

I ran across this one very recently. I believe it is Australian from all I can hear of it. I thought you might be interested. I will not be able to attend the meeting in Cody Wyoming, even though I have been a member of the museum for many years. Tell [museum director] Paul Fees that I have memory of him.

Texas Jack, you are amusin'. By Lord Harry, how I laughed  
When I seen yer rig and saddle with its bulwarks fore-and-aft;  
Holy smoke! In such a saddle how the dickens can yer fall?

Gosh! so-help-me! strike-me-balmy! If a bit o' scenery  
Like ter you in all yer rig-out on the earth I ever see!  
How I'd like ter see a bushman use yer fixins, Texas Jack;

*The poem goes on in this vein for several verses, relying heavily on dialect, and comparing Texas Jack's riding style, shooting abilities and scouting talents unfavorably to native Australian capabilities. But then it concludes with a patriotic defense of Australian culture.*

"P.S.- As poet and as Yankee I will greet you, Texas Jack,  
For it isn't no ill-feelin' that is gettin' up my back,  
But I won't see this land crowded by each Yank and British cuss  
Who takes it in his head to come a-civilizin' us.  
So if you feel like shootin' now, don't let yer pistol cough-  
(Our Government is very free at chokin' fellers off);  
And though on your great continent there's misery in the towns  
An' not a few untitled lords and kings without their crowns,  
I will admit your countrymen is busted big, an' free,  
An' great on ekal rites of men and great on liberty;  
I will admit yer fathers punched the gory tyrant's head,  
But then we've got our heroes, too, the diggers that is dead -  
....." [and so on]
